ORDINANCE O- 6: -15

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF MORRISTOWN TOWN COUNCIL
ACCEPTING AN EASEMENT ON A PORTION OF BLOCK 3505, LOTS
15.01 AND 15.02 AS SHOWN ON THE OFFICIAL TAX MAP OF THE
TOWN OF MORRISTOWN FOR CONSERVATION AND ACCESS
PURPOSES

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12-4 and 40A:12-5, the Town of Morristown (the “Town”) is authorized to acquire, by ordinance, real property by purchase, gift, devise, lease, exchange, condemnation, or installment purchase agreement; and

WHEREAS, Spring Place Assisted Living Center, LLC (“Grantor) owns certain real property situate in the Town of Morristown, in County of Morris, State of New Jersey, commonly known as Block 3505, Lot 15, (hereinafter the “Property”).

WHEREAS, with the consent of the Grantor, Public Service Electric and Gas Company (“PSEG”) served as the applicant for Planning Board Application No. 13-14 seeking to subdivide the Property into two lots, consisting of Lot 15.01 consisting of the majority of the existing parcel of land containing the Spring Hills Assisted Living Residence and Lot 15.02 located on the Whippany River that required environmental remediation;

WHEREAS, in accordance with a condition of approval of Planning Board Application No. 13-14, dated July 24, 2014, wherein Grantor was required to record this Easement setting forth certain covenants and restrictions concerning the Property; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Board approval required Grantor to impose a perpetual Conservation Easement covering Lot 15.02;

WHEREAS, the Planning Board approval also required Grantor to grant the Grantee an Access Easement for installation of a pedestrian pathway and stairway that may cross Lots 15.01 and 15.02 at a location to be determined by the Grantee at its sole discretion, which Access Easement serving as an exception to the Conservation Easement covering Lot 15.02; and

WHEREAS, the easement rights to be granted are free and clear of any liens and encumbrances which would unreasonably limit the purposes of the easement; and

WHEREAS, the Town desires to accept the grant of the easement rights on Block 3505, Lots 15.01 and 15.02 for conservation and access purposes and more particularly set forth in the Conservation and Access Easement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Mayor and Council of the Town of Morristown in the County of Morris, New Jersey, as follows:

Section 1. The easement grant from Spring Place Assisted Living Center, LLC, as Grantor, to the Town as set forth in the Conservation and Access Easement on Block 3505, Lots 15.01 and 15.02 for conservation and access purposes is hereby accepted; and

Section 2. The Mayor and Township Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver any document and, together with the Town's consultants, to take any and all necessary steps as would be reasonable or necessary to effectuate said acceptance and to effectuate the purposes of this Ordinance; and

Section 3. The Town Business Administrator, Town Attorney and the Mayor are hereby authorized to sign, and the Town Clerk to witness, any document in a form acceptable to the Town Attorney necessary or desirable to accomplish the actions set forth herein; and

Section 4. The aforesaid recitals be and hereby are adopted and incorporated herein as if repeated in full; and

Section 5. If any section, paragraph, subsection, clause, or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by the courts to be invalid, such adjudication shall apply only to the section, paragraph, subsection, clause, or provision so adjudicated, and the remainder of the Ordinance shall be deemed valid and effective; and

Section 6. Any ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are repealed to the extent of such conflict; and

Section 7. This Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication in accordance with applicable law.

ORDINANCE O- 7 - 2015

**AN ORDINANCE TO MANDATE DIRECT DEPOSIT FOR MUNICIPAL
EMPLOYEES OF THE TOWN OF MORRISTOWN PURSUANT TO N.J.S.A 52:14-15f
(b) *et. seq.* AS AMENDED BY P.L. 2013, c. 28**

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 52:14-15f(b), as amended by P.L. 2013 c. 28, authorized local governments to mandate direct deposit for certain governmental employees effective July 1, 2014; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with this statute, as of the effective date of this Ordinance, the Town of Morristown mandates that direct deposit of net pay be established for all employees, including any person holding public office, position, or employment whose compensation is paid by the Town of Morristown; and

WHEREAS, such compensation is to be deposited directly into each employee's specific banking institution based upon information provided by the employee; and

WHEREAS, the Chief Financial Officer shall make available for such employees who have net pay directly deposited, any information concerning net pay, any accompanying information approved for distribution with net pay, and W-2 forms in accordance with applicable federal law, only on the Internet with restricted access and policies and procedures to protect the integrity and confidentiality of the information; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 52:14-15f permits governing bodies to grant exemptions on such terms and conditions as they deem necessary; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Morristown deems it appropriate that all seasonal and temporary employees not be provided with their compensation through direct deposit; and

WHEREAS, other municipal employees may request, in writing, an exemption from the direct deposit mandate to the Town of Morristown's Chief Financial Officer; and

WHEREAS, such requests will be presented to the Town Council, which may grant an exemption by resolution and only upon a showing of good cause;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Morristown, County of Morris, State of New Jersey, being the governing body thereof, as follows:

Section 1. All full time and part time employees and elected public officials who receive compensation from the Town of Morristown, from the effective date of this Ordinance, be and hereby are mandated to have direct deposit of their compensation in accordance with N.J.S.A. 52:14-15f (b).

Section 2. The Chief Financial Officer shall make available for Town employees who have net pay directly deposited, any information concerning net pay, any accompanying information approved for distribution with net pay, and W-2 forms in accordance with applicable federal law, only on the Internet with restricted access and policies and procedures to protect the integrity and confidentiality of the information.

Section 3. All seasonal and temporary employees who are employed by the Town of Morristown are exempt from the direct deposit mandate.

Section 4. Other municipal employees may request, in writing, an exemption from the direct deposit mandate to the Town of Morristown's Chief Financial Officer. Such requests will be presented to the Town Council for consideration, which shall be granted by resolution and upon a showing of good cause.

Section 5. If any Section, paragraph, subdivision, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged invalid, such adjudication shall apply only to the Section, paragraph subdivision, clause or provision so adjudged and the remainder of the Ordinance shall be deemed valid and effective.

Section 6. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with or in conflict with the Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency.

Section 7. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after publication and passage according to law.

ORDINANCE O- 8 - 2015

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING THE CODE OF THE TOWN OF MORRISTOWN CHAPTER 7 "TRAFFIC"

WHEREAS, the Town of Morristown desires to modify certain parking restrictions on various streets within the Town including, Morris Street, Speedwell Avenue, Washington Street, Miller Street, Early Street, and South Park Place;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Council of the Town of Morristown, County of Morris and State of New Jersey, being the governing body thereof, that Chapter 7 Traffic, be and is hereby amended and supplemented to include and read as follows:

7-11 STOPPING, STANDING OR PARKING PROHIBITED DURING CERTAIN HOURS ON CERTAIN STREETS.

a. No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle between the hours specified on any day upon any of the streets or parts of streets described.

b. *Stopping Standing or Parking Prohibited Between the Hours of 2:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m.* No person shall stop or stand a vehicle between the hours of 2:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m. on any of the following named roadways:

7-12 TIME LIMIT PARKING.

7-12.2 Time Limit Metered Parking - (Parking Meters: Zones).

a. *Definitions.* As used in this subsection:

Parking meter shall mean and include any mechanical device or meter not inconsistent with this subsection placed or erected for the regulation of parking by authority of this subsection.

Parking meter space shall mean a space in the street alongside the curb within which a vehicle shall be properly parked, which space shall be bounded by the curb and lines marked on the street and shall have a parking meter installed adjacent to the curb side of the space.

b. *Time Limits Established.* The following time limits are hereby established in parking meter zones in the Town of Morristown: 30 minutes; 60 minutes; 90 minutes; 2 hours; 12 hours; 18 hours.

c. *Effective Meter Periods Established.* The following effective meter periods are hereby established in parking meter zones in the Town of Morristown:

Period A – 8AM to 8PM, Monday through Saturday, holidays excepted.

Period B – 8AM to 5PM, Monday through Saturday, holidays excepted.

Period C – 6AM to 12 Midnight, Monday through Saturday, holidays excepted

Period D – 9AM to 8PM, Monday through Friday, 8AM to 8PM Saturday, holidays excepted

Period E – 9AM to 4PM and 6PM to 8PM, Monday through Friday, 8AM to 8PM Saturday, holidays excepted

Period F – 9:30AM to 2:30PM and 4:00PM to 8PM, Monday through Friday, 8AM to 8PM Saturday, holidays excepted

Period G – 9:30AM to 8PM, Monday through Saturday, holidays excepted

d. *Parking Meter Zones Regulations.* Parking meter zones and regulations are hereby established as described in paragraphs b., c., and d. on the streets, portions of streets, and sides of streets indicated, as set forth Schedule I.

e. *Installation of Meters.* In the parking meter zones hereby created or hereafter created, a parking meter shall be installed adjacent to the curb side of each parking meter space as may be designated by the

Governing Body. The meter shall be placed not more than two (2) feet from the curb and each space shall be marked out as an individual parking space for vehicles. Each meter shall be set to operate upon the deposit of one (1) or more coins as set forth in subsection.

f. Each meter shall be arranged so as to show or display a signal which shall clearly indicate whether the time limit during which parking in the space is permitted has expired.

g. *Operation of Parking Meters and Rate Schedule.* Except in a period of emergency determined by a member of the Department of Administration and Public Safety, or except in compliance with the directions of a Police or Fire Officer, or except during certain hours on certain streets, or portions thereof, when and where parking is prohibited in order to expedite the flow of traffic, when any vehicle shall be parked in a parking meter space between the hours specified in paragraph c. of this subsection, the owner, operator or driver of any vehicle shall, upon entering the parking meter space, immediately deposit a coin or coins in the parking meter as follows:

1. (Rate Schedule a) In one-half (1/2) hour zones, deposit one (1) ten (\$.10) cent coin for each twelve (12) minutes of parking time.

2. (Rate Schedule b) In one (1) hour zones, deposit one (1) ten (\$.10) cent coin for each fifteen (15) minutes of parking time or one (1) twenty-five cent (\$.25) "convenience coin" for thirty (30) minutes of parking time.

3. (Rate Schedule c) In two (2) hour zones, deposit one (1) ten (\$.10) cent coin for each twelve (12) minutes of parking time.

4. (Rate Schedule d) In twelve (12) hour zones, deposit one (1) twenty-five (\$.25) cent coin for each two (2) hours of parking time to a maximum of twelve (12) hours of parking time.

h. *Parking Time Limits.* Any vehicle parking or standing in any designated parking meter space in a parking meter zone shall be parked within the lines marked on the street or curb and may occupy the space during the parking limit provided by the ordinance of the town for the part of the street in which the parking meter space is located. In a 30-minute zone, parking or standing a vehicle in a designated parking meter space shall be lawful for fifteen minutes for each ten-cent (\$.10) coin deposited, not exceeding a total of 30 minutes. In a one-hour zone, parking or standing a vehicle in a designated parking meter space shall be lawful for fifteen minutes for each ten-cent (\$.10) coin deposited, not exceeding a total of one hour, or for one twenty-five cent (\$.25) "convenience coin" deposited for a thirty-minute period. In a two-hour zone, parking or standing a vehicle in a designated parking meter space shall be lawful for one ten-cent (\$.10) coin for each fifteen-minutes or one twenty-five cent (\$.25) "convenience coin" deposited for each thirty-minutes, not exceeding a total of two hours. In a twelve-hour zone, parking or standing a vehicle in a designated parking meter space shall be lawful for two hours for each twenty-five cent (\$.25) coin deposited, not to exceed a total of twelve hours.

i. *Unlawful Extension of Parking Time.* It shall be unlawful for any person to deposit or cause to be deposited in a parking meter, any coins for the purpose of extending the parking time beyond the total lawful parking period provided for the parking space along side or next to which the parking meter is placed. It shall be unlawful to willfully break, destroy or impair the usefulness of, or to open without lawful authority, any parking meter installed in a parking meter zone. It shall be unlawful to deposit or cause to be deposited in any parking meter any slug, device or substitute for a coin of the United States of America.

It shall be unlawful to deposit or cause to be deposited a "sleeper" coin, which is a coin placed in the coin slot without the handle being turned thus activating the mechanism as per instructions.

7-14 PARKING PROHIBITED AT ALL TIMES ON CERTAIN STREETS.

No person shall park a vehicle at any time upon any streets or parts thereof described.

ORDINANCE O-2 -2015**

AN ORDINANCE DISSOLVING THE MORRISTOWN REDEVELOPMENT AGENCY AND MOVING ITS REMAINING OBLIGATIONS AND RIGHTS INTO THE TOWN OF MORRISTOWN

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-1, et seq., known as the “Local Redevelopment and Housing Law” (the “Redevelopment Law”) authorizes municipalities to create a redevelopment agency as defined under pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:12A-11 of the Redevelopment Law to carry out the objective of a redevelopment plan; and

WHEREAS, the Morristown Redevelopment Agency (“MRA”) was created pursuant to the powers stated herein by way of Ordinance No. 26-98, adopted by the Town Council on July 21, 1998, and codified by the Town Clerk as the Code of Morristown for the purpose of carrying out the redevelopment of the historic Vail Mansion site located in accordance with the Vail Mansion Redevelopment Plan under the Local Redevelopment and Housing Law; and

WHEREAS, the Town Ordinance creating the MRA, includes a “sunset” provision providing that the Agency “shall cease to exist upon the completion of the effectuation of the Vail Mansion Redevelopment Plan”; and

WHEREAS, the construction and occupancy of the Vail Mansion redevelopment is complete with the residential component and the Vail Mansion structure (which is a portion of the overall redevelopment project) being completely built-out and occupied; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:14B-1, et seq., (“Local Fiscal Control Law”), the Town has the power to dissolve the MRA by ordinance, so long as it guarantees its obligations, and undertakes its governmental operations; and

WHEREAS, in an effort to create more efficient and economic governmental practices, all agreements, contracts, or employees deemed to be unnecessary or superfluous can be reevaluated, and if necessary, voided by the Town; and

WHEREAS, the RATM has no assets, debts, real property or lease rights; and

WHEREAS, all governmental operations currently supervised by the MRA relating to the Vail Mansion project, and there being no other obligations, debts and/or assets, shall be transferred to the Town.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Council of the Town of Morristown, County of Morris, State of New Jersey, being the governing body thereof, that pursuant to the Local Fiscal Control Law, the Town Council the Morristown Redevelopment Agency is here dissolved and all governmental operations currently supervised by the MRA relating to the Vail Mansion project, and there being no other obligations, debts and/or assets, shall be transferred to the Town. Adequate provisions shall be made by the Town for its supervision of such obligations currently supervised by the MRA relating to the Vail Mansion project; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, if any section, paragraph, subsection, clause, or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged by the courts to be invalid, such adjudication shall apply only to the section,

paragraph, subsection, clause, or provision so adjudicated, and the remainder of the Ordinance shall be deemed valid and effective; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, any ordinances or parts thereof in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are repealed to the extent of such conflict; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, to the extent that any portion of this Ordinance conflicts with or amends or modifies any provision of any other of the ordinances, this Ordinance shall supersede or amend or modify, as applicable, such ordinances; and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, this Ordinance shall take effect upon passage and publication in accordance with applicable law.

WHEREAS, the Local Government Cap Law, N.J.S. 40A: 4-45.1 et seq., provides that in the preparation of its annual budget, a municipality shall limit any increase in said budget up to 1.5% unless authorized by ordinance to increase it to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, subject to certain exceptions; and,

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.15a provides that a municipality may, when authorized by ordinance, appropriate the difference between the amount of its actual final appropriation and the 3.5% percentage rate as an exception to its final appropriations in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

WHEREAS, the Town Council of the Town of Morristown in the County of Morris finds it advisable and necessary to increase its CY 2015 budget by up to 3.5% over the previous year's final appropriations, in the interest of promoting the health, safety and welfare of the citizens; and,

WHEREAS, the Town of Morristown hereby determines that a 3.5 % increase in the budget for said year, amounting to \$984,002 in excess of the increase in final appropriations otherwise permitted by the Local Government Cap Law, is advisable and necessary; and,

WHEREAS the Town of Morristown hereby determines that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED, by the Town Council of the Town of Morristown, in the County of Morris, a majority of the full authorized membership of this governing body affirmatively concurring, that, in the CY 2015 budget year, the final appropriations of the Town of Morristown shall, in accordance with this ordinance and N.J.S.A. 40A: 4-45.14, be increased by 3.5%, amounting to \$984,002, and that the CY 2015 municipal budget for the Town of Morristown be approved and adopted in accordance with this ordinance; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that any that any amount authorized hereinabove that is not appropriated as part of the final budget shall be retained as an exception to final appropriation in either of the next two succeeding years; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance as introduced be filed with the Director of the Division of Local Government Services within 5 days of introduction; and,

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED, that a certified copy of this ordinance upon adoption, with the recorded vote included thereon, be filed with said Director within 5 days after such adoption.

Hartke, P.E., Director of Public Works/Town Engineer and issued April 20, 2015 as follows:

The staff of Jacobs Engineering, has conducted a field survey for NJDOT of existing unapproved bus stop locations along Route US 202, in the Town of Morristown, County of Morris. 

I have been forwarded your email regarding the question(s) you have on the codes regulating house rentals. I would like to speak with you and ask some more specific questions about the property itself so I can better answer your questions and investigate if there are any code violations.

I can tell you that as far as zoning regulations and the State of NJ, assuming that all other required department paperwork has been completed up to 5 unrelated lodgers may occupy a single family house with common bathing and kitchen facilities. The required paperwork and inspections would include Certificate of Habitability Inspection, Occupancy Standard Certification, and Rent Registration.

If the owner and family are residing in the house, then (by Town code) only one room may be rented.

Please forward me the exact address of the property in questions. I will check with Property Maintenance and Rent Leveling to see if all proper inspections referred above were conducted. If in fact all inspections were performed and met the appropriate codes, I will have the PM inspectors conduct a follow up inspection to see that the same conditions exist today that were present when the original inspections were conducted.

NEW SOUTHERN SWIMMING AREA AT ISLAND BEACH STATE PARK ANNOUNCED

LIFEGUARD PROTECTION AVAILABLE THIS SUMMER NEAR POPULAR A-7 AREA

(15/P32) TRENTON – In another effort to make visits to New Jersey’s state parks a safer and more enjoyable experience, Department of Environmental Protection Commissioner Bob Martin announced today the start of a new, lifeguarded swimming area near the popular A-7 section of the park for the summer season.

Lifeguard protection for swimmers and waders has traditionally been located behind the main pavilions at Ocean Bathing Areas 1 and 2. The new southern swimming area will be located about four miles beyond the entrance to the park, just to the north of the recently reconstructed Fisherman’s Walkway access point. It will accommodate all visitors, including those who arrive by boat at Tices Shoal and enter the park from a new designated entry point on the west side of the walkway.

Swimming at all other unguarded sections of Island Beach State Park remains prohibited.

“The safety of our park visitors is our first priority,” said Richard Boornazian, DEP Assistant Commissioner of Natural and Historic Resources. “Emergencies in unguarded sections of the park often results in compromised lifeguard resources at our main pavilion areas where swimming is permitted. So providing this additional protection at the popular A-7 section will benefit all users of the park.”

The designation of a new southern swimming area will also give anglers who traditionally enter at Fisherman’s Walkway a more defined area to fish, without the intrusion of swimmers. These anglers, who use the walkway to enter the beach on foot or by wheelchair, will have a delineated area open exclusively for fishing south of the swimming area. Fishing will be permitted in the swimming area when lifeguards are not on duty.

Mobile sport fishing access at A-7 will also remain and not be affected by the swimming area. Those vehicles must park south of the pedestrian anglers fishing section.

“Our goal is to provide safe and equitable access to all of our visitors,” said Island Beach State Park manager Ray Bukowski. “The addition of this new swimming area will not only create a safe haven for swimmers with some of the best lifeguards at the Jersey Shore, but will also eliminate any conflicting use of distinct areas of the park.”

Once again, summer gate entry fees (\$6 New Jersey resident/\$12 non-resident on weekdays; \$10 New Jersey resident/\$20 non-resident on weekends and holidays) remain unchanged.

A \$3 walk-in fee (free for children under 3-years old) will be assessed for those who enter the park at Fisherman's Walkway adjacent to Tices Shoal while lifeguards are on duty. Access to the park by boat is only permitted at the Fisherman's Walkway bayside access. The State Park Service does not maintain or regulate Tices Shoal, but does regulate access and use of Island Beach State Park and its resources.

Island Beach State Park is one of the crown jewels of the state park system and one of the most popular summer destinations in all of New Jersey. Shaped by storms and tides, the park is a narrow barrier island stretching for 10 miles between the ocean and Barnegat Bay. It is one of New Jersey's last significant remnants of a barrier island ecosystem and is one of the few remaining undeveloped barrier beaches on the north Atlantic coast.

Since Superstorm Sandy hit in October, 2012, Island Beach State Park has seen the repair or restoration of the boardwalks and the lifeguard station at Ocean Bathing Area 1, the gatehouse and maintenance buildings within the park.

A major repair of the Sandy-damaged north jetty at Barnegat Inlet, at the southern tip of the park, was completed last October. A state-funded dune replenishment project to bolster a vulnerable section of the northern most section of the beach was completed in 2013.



RE: SUPPORTING THE TRANSPARENT TAX ACT OF 2015

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill No. A-4235 supplementing chapter 4 of Title 54, R.S.54:4-65 and designated the "Transparent Tax Act of 2015" is being considered for adoption by the New Jersey State Assembly; and

WHEREAS, the amendment would permit the local jurisdiction to print separate tax bills to each taxpayer, one showing the amount of property taxes due and payable for municipal tax purposes, the other shall state the amount of property taxes due and payable for county purposes, school purposes, fire district purposes, and for the purposes of any other special district on behalf of which the municipality collects property taxes; and

WHEREAS, both bills shall include a brief tabulation showing the distribution of the total amount to be raised by taxes; and

WHEREAS, A-4235 would require the municipal tax collector to send notice of the pro rata share, if any, of the property tax appeal refunds paid by the municipality during the tax year to the county, school districts, and fire districts for inclusion in their annual budgets; and

WHEREAS, in the following tax year in which the refunds were paid, the municipal tax collector is then required to deduct the applicable pro rata share of the property tax refund from the amounts to be paid to the county, and each school and fire district; and

WHEREAS, these amendments, if adopted, will assist the general public to understand the tax bill, the structure of the taxes, and the level of support for each agency, and will further provide a more equitable structure to share the obligation of paying approved tax appeals as the title states, creates transparency in the tax supporting local assessments.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Mayor and Township Committee of the Township of Morris, in the County of Morris, in the State of New Jersey, hereby supports Assembly Bill A-4235 amending Title 54:4-65 and urges the Legislature to approve and pass the bill for the reasons expressed herein; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Majority Leader of the NJ State Assembly, the President of the NJ Senate, and the Governor of the State of NJ, the New Jersey State League of Municipalities, and Morris County municipalities.
