A. Statement of Compliance with Open Public Meetings Act

Minutes of a regular meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Morristown, held on May 26, 2015, in the Council Room of the Morristown Town Hall located at 200 South Street, Morristown, New Jersey, beginning at 7:34pm, prevailing time.

Council President Feldman presiding.

Town Clerk Kevin D. Harris read the following statement: Notice of this meeting was provided in compliance with the Open Public Meetings Act in accordance with a Resolution adopted by the Council of the town of Morristown at the Organization Meeting on January 6, 2015 setting forth the time, date and location of each meeting. A copy of the Resolution was distributed to the Morris County Daily Record and the Star Ledger, filed with the Town Clerk, posted on the Bulletin Board at the Municipal Building and mailed to any person who has requested and prepaid the established fee for such meeting notice.

Airy to the Corner of Linden Street, on Saturday, August 8, 2015 (rain date Sunday, August 9, 2015) from 3:00 p.m. – 9:00 p.m., for their Annual Block Party.

Council President Feldman made a motion that the Consent Agenda be moved for Adoption which was seconded by Council Member Foster and adopted on the following roll call vote.

F. Mayor's Proclamations and Presentations – None for the evening.

G. Public Hearing

At this time the Council President opened the meeting to the public asking if there were any citizen or taxpayer who wished to be heard concerning any matter.

Lila Bernstein, 6 Corry Lane, Mendham, who is the property owner of 90 Elm Street, Morristown, advised and updated Council on the issues concerning the demolition of the property following the fire and the issues faced. Ms. Bernstein stated that they did not wish to take any action until the Morris County Prosecutor's Office had completed their investigation and issued a final report. Ms. Bernstein further stated that she has remained in constant communication with Code Enforcement and requested that someone

from Administration please reach out to help her resolve the situation.

Marion Harris, 14 Oak Street, Morristown, who is Vice President of the Morristown Historic Preservation Commission, spoke to the Council on the issues related to the fire at 90 Elm Street. Ms. Harris informed the Council that the Preservation Commission did issue a report stating that the block front at 90 Elm Street is the last and perhaps only remaining 19th Century block front still in the Town. As such, Ms. Harris requested that all efforts be made to preserve and protect it. Ms. Harris further stressed that issues related to 90 Elm Street should be referred to the Historic Preservation Commission as this is the reason that the Commission exists and one of the functions it serves.

Roger Mayerson, 21 Miller Street, Morristown, spoke again concerning Ordinance O-8-2015, stating that the residents of Miller Street do not wish to have that street included under the restrictions of the Ordinance.

Margaret Brady, 1 Franklin Place, Morristown, spoke to the Council regarding “Franklin Corners” to which she is a neighbor of. Ms. Brady stated that she received emails from individuals who were unable to attend the meeting concerning Resolution R-85-2016 and that she request Council deliberate very carefully and take its time before voting to demolish a structure of significant historical and aesthetic value.

William Byrne, 100 Franklin Street, Morristown, expressed his concern with doing a little better than the already great job that the Town has taken with respects to Pedestrian Safety. Mr. Byrne stated that as he was leaving church; he was almost struck by a car. Mr. Byrne suggested a public advertisement stating that roads are not racetracks.

There appearing no one further to be heard, the Council President closed the public portion of the meeting.

Council Member Elms arrived at 7:52 p.m..

Town Business Administrator, Michael Rogers stated that there is an Ordinance O-16-2015, which is identical to Ordinance O-8-2015, with the exception that Miller Street has been removed. Mr. Rogers informed Council that they would still have to take action on Ordinance O-8-2015, if if they introduce Ordinance O-16-2015 with the change.

Council Member Deeb asked if the Council should vote it down. Mr. Rogers replied that action would have to be taken.

Mr. Rogers then stated that after the fire on January 31, 2015, the Town Administration took quick action to have the Town’s consulting structural engineer examine the property to determine if the buildings were structurally unsound. Mr. Rogers stated that a report had been prepared and made available to Council Members on or about February 3, 2015, wherein it was

determined that the buildings at that location were structurally unsound and there was an imminent hazard to the public. Mr. Rogers stated that the Town has been very patient and has spoken extensively with the Bernsteins as to the future intentions of the property. Mr. Rogers states that due diligence has been exercised and that all viable plans have been examined. Mr. Rogers further stated that public safety has been and remains to be the primary concern on the part of the Town. Mr. Rogers further stated that while a report from the Prosecutor's Office may be forthcoming; Mr. Rogers stated that the Town had to take steps based upon the Construction Official's determination. Mr. Rogers states that this is only the first step and further action for Council consideration is needed.

Mayor Dougherty noted that the Administration is only asking for the first step to be approved and this is only a pressing issue because of public safety.

Council Member Harris stated that while she agrees with the findings of the report; she inquired if anything could be done to save and rehabilitate the structure.

Council Member Armington stated that while it is obvious that the Town cannot direct a property owner to preserve the property; he too inquired as to whether there has been any discussion with the property owners to preserve the property.

Mr. Rogers stated that there may have been some discussion; however, he does not know the answer to whether the property can be rehabilitated. He stated that this is again the final decision of the property owner. Mr. Rogers further stated that this is again only the first step and that he needs to legal authorization from Council to proceed further.

Council Member Armington stated that why is the Town seeking to allocate money when it is typically the responsibility of the property owner. Mr. Rogers responded that the Town would be reimbursed.

Council Member Deeb asked for a detailed explanation as to the steps. Mr. Rogers replied that because the money is not in the municipal budget; he needs this authorization. Council Member Deeb asked why is the Town taking the approach that demolition is the only issue and whatever steps taking by the Administration is not enough.

Council Member Harris asked if someone is injured in the property; who can be sued. Town Attorney Vijayant Pawar, Esq., stated that the property owner and the Town can be sued. The Town especially because the Town has deemed the properties as "unsafe structures" and needs to take action to ensure public safety.

Council Member Deeb asked that if the structure has been blocked off; what other instances has the Administration seen individuals violating the obstacles. Council Member Deeb stated that couldn't the structure be better

fenced in rather than be considered for demolition. Mr. Rogers replied that all that can be done has been done.

Council Member Deeb asked if two weeks would make a difference to explore other options. Mr. Rogers stated that based on the recommendation of the Construction Official; this is the action that he is recommending to Council.

Council Member Smith-Reid asked that the only action being asked to be taken by Council is to allocate the funds for a possible demolition. Council Member Smith further asked at what point and how would be further Council action be required. Mr. Rogers stated that the issue would again come for Council consideration at such time as the Administration asks Council to approve a demolition contract which would be done in the form of a resolution following a bid process.

Mr. Pawar noted that this may not come to fruition if the property owner takes it upon themselves to either demolish the property using their own funds. Council President Feldman added or if the property owner takes some action to rehabilitate the property meeting the structural requirements. Mr. Pawar agreed.

Council President Feldman stated that it would be a disappointment to see another historic landmark disappear from the Morristown landscape. While she understands that it is ultimately the decision of the property owner; she would like to see this property saved if possible.

Council Member Armington stated that he has no problem supporting the Resolution in that he understands that it is the first step and there will be other opportunities for the Council to exercise checks and balances. Council Member Armington encouraged the Council Members to vote as they see fit.

J. Report of Mayor and Town Officials

The Mayor concluded that tomorrow, Wednesday, May 27, 2015; the Mayor noted that the Morris County Board of Chosen Freeholders would be having

their monthly meeting here at Morristown Town Hall. This is a project of the Freeholders whereby they hold their monthly meetings in a different municipality within the County each month.
